Mosquito Control Division Announces Neighborhood Truck Foggings Tonight

The City of Portsmouth's Mosquito Control Division is in full mosquito prevention and control mode and is requesting Portsmouth property owners to join them in this fight!

As staff have increased mosquito surveillance and treatment of standing water and properties, this evening they will begin the first neighborhood truck foggings of the season.

The City of Portsmouth's mosquito control zones are identified by routes and to view them open the Mosquito Base Spray Map attachment.

For Tuesday, May 9th:

Routes 1, 4, and 5 are scheduled for truck fogging this evening, beginning at 7 p.m.

Route 1 includes: Churchland West, Peachtree, Long Point, Bishops Green, Hidden Cove, River Shores, Merrifields, Edgefield, Brandon Square, Windmill Shores


Routes 4 and 5 include: Park Manor, Mayflower Park, Elizabeth Manor, Hodges Ferry, Manor View, City Park, Simonsdale, Hodges Manor, Collinswood, Hattonsville

Truck foggings will continue throughout the City and the schedule will be announced for additional spray routes.

Beekeepers should keep bees covered during spraying operations, and people with known allergies should stay indoors. For spray schedule updates or questions, citizens should call the Portsmouth Mosquito Hotline at 393-8666.
